NOTICE is hereby given that the **26TH Annual General Meeting** of the members of **Sanmit Infra Limited** will be held on **Wednesday, 30TH September, 2026 at 01:00 p.m.** through Video Conferencing / Other Audio Visual Means (VC/OAVM) to transact the following businesses:

ORDINARY BUSINESS:

1. ADOPTION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND REPORTS THEREON :

To receive, consider and adopt the Audited Financial Statements of the Company for the Financial Year ended March 31, 2026 together with the Reports of the Board of Directors and the Auditors thereon.

2. APPOINTMENT OF A DIRECTOR IN PLACE OF RETIRING BY ROTATION:

To appoint a director in place of Mr. Haresh Kanayalal Makhija (DIN: 00586720), who is liable to retire by rotation and being eligible, offers himself for re-appointment.

“RESOLVED THAT pursuant to the provisions of Sections 149, 150, 152, 161 and other applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (“Act”), and the rules made thereunder, read with Schedule IV to the Act, and Regulation 25 and other applicable provisions of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (“SEBI LODR Regulations”), as amended from time to time, Mrs. Sejal Nilesh Patel (DIN:11588688), who was appointed by the Board of Directors as an Additional Director of the Company in the capacity of an Independent Director with effect from 14-08-2026, and who holds office up to the date of this Annual General Meeting pursuant to Section 161(1) of the Act, and who has submitted a declaration confirming that she meets the criteria of independence prescribed under Section 149(6) of the Act and Regulation 16(1)(b) of the SEBI LODR Regulations and is eligible for appointment as an Independent Director, be and is hereby appointed as an Independent Director of the Company, not liable to retire by rotation, to hold office for a term of [five] consecutive years commencing from 14-08-2026 up to 13-08-2031.

1. The Statement pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("Act") in respect of Item Nos. 3 to 6 of the accompanying Notice, is annexed hereto.
2. In accordance with the General Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020, General Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, General Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 5, 2020 and subsequent circulars issued in this regard, the latest being General Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025 issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (hereinafter collectively referred to as "**MCA Circulars**") and Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/ CMD1/ CIR/P/2020/79 dated May 12, 2020, SEBI/ HO/CFD/CMD2/ CIR/P/2021/11 dated January 15, 2021, SEBI/HO/CFD/ CMD2/CIR/P/2022/62 dated May 13, 2022, SEBI/HO/CFD/ PoD-2/P/CIR/2023/4 dated January 5, 2023, SEBI/HO/CFD/ CFD-PoD-2/P/ CIR/2023/167 dated October 07, 2023, SEBI/ HO/CFD/ CFDPoD-2/P/CIR/2024/133 dated October 3, 2024 read with Master Circular No. HO/49/14/14(7)2025CFD-POD2/I/3762/2026 dated January 30, 2026 issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (hereinafter collectively referred as "**SEBI Circulars**") (MCA Circulars and SEBI Circulars are hereinafter collectively referred to as "**the Circulars**") and in compliance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("Act") and the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("**SEBI Listing Regulations**"), the AGM is being held through Video Conferencing ("**VC**") facility / Other Audio Visual Means ("**OAVM**") without the physical presence of the Members at a common venue. In compliance with the said Circulars, AGM shall be conducted through VC / OAVM. The deemed venue for the 26TH AGM shall be the Registered Office of the Company i.e.. 601, Makhija Royale, 6th Floor, S.V. Road, Khar (W), Mumbai, Maharashtra, India, 400052.
3. Since the 26TH AGM will be held through VC / OAVM, the Route Map is not annexed in this Notice.
4. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act, a Member entitled to attend and vote at the AGM is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote on his/her behalf and the proxy need not be a Member of the Company. Since this AGM is being held pursuant to the MCA Circulars and SEBI Circular through VC / OAVM, physical attendance of Members has been dispensed with. Accordingly, the facility for appointment of proxies by the Members will not be available for the AGM and hence the Proxy Form and Attendance Slip are not annexed to this Notice.
5. In compliance with the provisions of Section 108 of the Act, read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014, as amended from time to time, and Regulation 44 of the LODR Regulations, the Company has extended e-voting facility for its members to enable them to cast their votes electronically on the resolutions set forth in this notice. The instructions for e-voting are provided in this notice. The Remote E-voting commences on Sunday, 27th September, 2026 at 09.00 A.M. (IST) and ends on Tuesday, 29th September, 2026 at 05.00 P.M. (IST). The voting rights of the Shareholders shall be in proportion to their shares of the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date, i.e., Wednesday, 23rd September, 2026

6. Any person who is not a member post cut-off date should treat this notice for information purposes only.
7. A person, whose name is recorded in the Register of Members or in the Register of Beneficial Owners maintained by the depositories as on the cut-off date only shall be entitled to avail the facility of remote e-voting as well as voting at the AGM.
8. Any person, who acquires shares and becomes a Member of the Company after sending the notice and holding shares as of the cut-off date, i.e., Wednesday, 23rd September, 2026, may obtain the login ID and password by sending a request at helpdesk.evoting@cdslindia.com or to the Registrar and Share Transfer Agent (RTA) support@purvashare.com. However, if he/she is already registered with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for remote e-voting then he/she can use his/her existing User ID and password for casting the vote.
9. Mr. Ramesh Chandra Mishra, Practising Company Secretary (Membership No. FCS 5477 CP No. 3987) from M/s Ramesh Mishra & Associates, vide Board Resolution dated 14th August 2026 has been appointed as the Scrutinizer to scrutinize the voting and e-voting process in a fair and transparent manner.
10. The Scrutinizer shall within a period not exceeding 2 (Two) working days from the conclusion of the e-voting period unblock the votes in the presence of at least 2 (Two) witnesses not in the employment of the Company and make a Scrutinizer's report of the votes cast in favour or against, if any, forthwith to the Chairman of the Company or a person authorised by him in writing.
11. The Results shall be declared after the AGM of the Company. The Results declared along with the Scrutinizer's Report shall be placed on the Company's website viz. www.sanmitinfraltd.com and on the website of CDSL within 2 (Two) working days of passing of the resolutions at the AGM of the Company and the same will also be communicated to the Stock Exchanges.
12. To support the 'Green Initiative', Members who have not yet registered their email addresses are requested to register the same with their Depository Participants (DPs) in case the shares are held by them in electronic form and with RTA in case the shares are held by them in physical form.
13. In compliance with the aforesaid MCA Circulars and SEBI Circular, Notice of the AGM along with the Annual Report 2025-26 is being sent only through electronic mode to those Members whose email addresses are registered with the Company/ RTA/ Depositories. Members may note that the Notice and Annual Report 2025-26 will also be available on the Company's website www.sanmitinfraltd.com, websites of the Stock Exchange i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com and on the website of CDSL at helpdesk.evoting@cdslindia.com. The Company will also be publishing an advertisement in newspaper containing the details about the AGM i.e. the conduct of AGM through VC/ OAVM, date and time of AGM, availability of notice of AGM at the Company's website,

manner of registering the email IDs of those shareholders who have not registered their email addresses with the Company/ RTA and other matters as may be required.

14. In compliance with the aforesaid MCA Circulars and SEBI Circular dated May 12, 2020 and January 15, 2021, the Annual Report 2025-26, the Notice of the AGM and the Instructions for e-Voting are being sent by electronic mode to all the Members whose e-mail addresses are registered with the Company / respective Depository Participants. Members may also note that the Annual Report 2025-26 and the Notice convening the AGM are also available on the Company's website www.sanmitinfraltd.com, websites of the Stock Exchange i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com and on the website of CDSL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility) helpdesk.evoting@cdslindia.com.
15. The Members can join the AGM in the VC / OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC / OAVM will be made available for 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
16. Members attending the AGM through VC / OAVM shall be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.
17. The Members who have cast their vote by remote e-voting prior to the AGM may also attend/ participate in the AGM through VC / OAVM but shall not be entitled to cast their vote again.
18. Pursuant to Section 91 of the Act The Register of Members and Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from Thursday, 24th September, 2026 to Wednesday, 30th September, 2026 (both days inclusive) for the purpose of AGM.
19. The Registers maintained under Section 170 & 189 of the Act, and the relevant documents referred to in the Notice will be available electronically for inspection till the conclusion of AGM by the members based on the request being sent on sanmitinfra@gmail.com.
20. Member(s) must quote their Folio Number/ DP ID & Client ID and contact details such as email address, contact no. etc. in all correspondences with the Company/ RTA.
21. As per Regulation 40 of LODR Regulations, as amended, securities of listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialized form with effect from April 1, 2019, except in case of request received for transmission or transposition of securities. In view of this and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and for ease of portfolio management, members holding shares in physical form are requested to consider converting their holdings to dematerialized form. Members can contact the RTA for

assistance in this regard.

22. In case of joint holders, the Member whose name appears as the first holder in the order of names as per the Register of Members of the Company will be entitled to vote at the AGM.
23. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 72 of the Act the Member(s) holding shares in physical form may nominate, in the prescribed manner, any person to whom all the rights in the shares shall vest in the event of death of the sole holder or all the joint holders. A nomination form for this purpose is available with the Company or its RTA. Member(s) holding shares in demat form may contact their respective DPs for availing this facility.
24. Member(s) holding shares in physical form is/ are requested to notify immediately any change of their respective addresses and bank account details. Please note that request for change of address, if found incomplete in any respect shall be rejected. Members holding shares in demat form are requested to notify any change in their addresses, e-mails and/or bank account mandates to their respective DPs only and not to the Company/ RTA for effecting such changes. The Company uses addresses, e-mails and bank account mandates furnished by the Depositories for updating its records of the Shareholders holding shares in electronic/demat form.
25. All the members whose names are recorded in the Register of Members or in the Register of Beneficial Owners maintained by the depositories as on Friday, 28th August, 2026 , have been considered for the purpose of sending the Notice of AGM and the Annual Report.

CDSL E-VOTING SYSTEM – FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS:

1. As you are aware, in view of the situation arising due to COVID-19 global pandemic, the general meetings of the companies shall be conducted as per the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) vide Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020, Circular No.17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 and Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020. The forthcoming AGM/EGM will thus be held through video conferencing (VC) or other audio visual means (OAVM). Hence, Members can attend and participate in the ensuing AGM/EGM through VC/OAVM.
2. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and MCA Circulars dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020 and May 05, 2020 the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized e-Voting's agency. The

facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting as well as the e-voting system on the date of the AGM will be provided by CDSL.

3. The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the EGM/AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available to at least 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
4. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of ascertaining the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
5. Pursuant to MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, , the facility to appoint proxy to attend and cast vote for the members is not available for this AGM. However, in pursuance of Section 112 and Section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, representatives of the members such as the President of India or the Governor of a State or body corporate can attend the AGM through VC/OAVM and cast their votes through e-voting.
6. In line with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.sanmitinfraltd.com. The Notice can also be accessed from the websites of the Stock Exchanges i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com. The AGM Notice is also disseminated on the website of CDSL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility and e-voting system during the AGM/EGM) i.e. www.evotingindia.com .
7. The AGM has been convened through VC/OAVM in compliance with applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 read with MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020.
8. In continuation of this Ministry's General Circular No. 20/2020, dated 05th May, 2020 and after due examination, it has been decided to allow companies whose AGMs were due to be held in the year 2020, or become due in the year 2021, to conduct their AGMs on or before 31.12.2021, in accordance with the requirements provided in paragraphs 3 and 4 of the General Circular No. 20/2020 as per MCA circular no. 02/2021 dated January,13, 2021.

THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2 : Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

- (i) The Remote e-voting period begins on Sunday, 27th September, 2026 at 9:00 am and ends on Tuesday, 29th September, 2026 at 5:00 pm. During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date Wednesday, 23rd September, 2026 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. **SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020**, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to **all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants**. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

- (iv) In terms of **SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020** on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

Pursuant to abovesaid SEBI Circular, Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meetings **for Individual shareholders holding securities in Demat mode CDSL/NSDL** is given below:

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS**1. INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENT :**

Sanmit Infra Limited ("the Company") operates across diversified business segments, including Bio-medical and other Waste Management, Infrastructure and Real Estate Development, Trading in Petroleum Products, Bitumen Emulsion and other Road Construction related materials, and Microsurfacing, road repair and allied services.

The Company's diversified business model enables it to participate in multiple sectors and pursue opportunities across infrastructure, road construction, waste management, petroleum products and real estate. The Company continues to evaluate business opportunities based on market conditions, commercial viability, availability of resources and the Company's ability to execute projects efficiently.

The infrastructure and road construction sectors continue to provide opportunities arising from increasing emphasis on development and maintenance of roads, urban infrastructure and allied facilities. The waste management sector is also witnessing increasing attention towards scientific, compliant and environmentally responsible handling and disposal of biomedical and other waste.

The real estate and infrastructure sectors remain dependent on economic growth, availability of financing, interest rates, government policies, regulatory developments and demand conditions. Similarly, the petroleum trading and road construction material businesses are influenced by commodity prices, demand-supply conditions, transportation costs and competitive intensity.

The Company believes that its presence across multiple business segments provides opportunities for business diversification and supports its long-term growth strategy.

2. ECONOMIC CONDITIONS AND BUSINESS CYCLES :

The performance of the Company is influenced by prevailing macro-economic conditions, business cycles, government expenditure, interest rates, inflation, commodity prices and changes in regulatory and taxation policies.

Infrastructure and road-related activities are dependent, among other factors, upon government and private sector expenditure on infrastructure development and maintenance. The waste management business is influenced by regulatory requirements, generation of biomedical and other waste, demand for compliant waste treatment and disposal services and the Company's ability to maintain the required operational and compliance standards.

The real estate and infrastructure development business is affected by prevailing market conditions, availability of finance, interest rates, property demand, regulatory approvals and other external factors.

The Company continues to monitor these factors and evaluates business opportunities with a view to maintaining operational efficiency and managing business risks.

3. BUSINESS PERFORMANCE AND OPERATIONAL OVERVIEW:

The Company is engaged in the following principal business activities:

1. Bio-medical and Other Waste Management
2. Infrastructure and Real Estate Development
3. Trading in Petroleum Products
4. Bitumen Emulsion and Other Road Construction Related Materials
5. Microsurfacing, Repair of Roads and Related Services

The Company continues to focus on strengthening its presence in its existing business segments while exploring commercially viable opportunities for growth.

The Company also undertakes activities relating to bitumen emulsion and other road construction materials, which complement its infrastructure and road-related business activities.

The Company's microsurfacing and road repair activities provide opportunities in the maintenance and rehabilitation of existing road infrastructure. The Company seeks to undertake projects based on commercial viability, availability of orders and its operational capabilities.

The Company is also engaged in bio-medical and other waste management activities. This segment provides an opportunity to participate in the growing requirement for systematic and environmentally responsible waste management solutions. The Company continues to assess opportunities in infrastructure and real estate development while considering prevailing market conditions and the availability of suitable projects.

4. ABILITY TO CONTROL COST AND ATTAIN HIGH PRODUCTIVITY:

In the road construction and microsurfacing business, timely execution of projects, effective deployment of skilled and unskilled manpower, efficient utilization of machinery and control over material consumption are important for maintaining cost competitiveness.

The Company continues to focus on efficient resource utilization, project planning, procurement management and operational controls to improve productivity and manage costs.

5. PRICING PRESSURE DUE TO COMPETITION / COMPETITIVE BIDDING:

The businesses in which the Company operates are competitive and pricing is influenced by market forces, demand and supply, competition, input costs and customer requirements. Infrastructure, microsurfacing and road repair projects may involve competitive bidding and tender-based procurement, particularly in relation to institutional and government-related projects. Competitive bidding may result in pricing pressure and may affect margins. Similarly, petroleum products and road construction materials are subject to prevailing market prices and competition.

The Company seeks to maintain competitiveness through efficient procurement, cost control, timely execution and maintaining appropriate relationships with customers and business partners.

6. HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT :

Human capital is an important contributor to the Company's growth and operational performance. The Company recognizes the importance of attracting, developing and retaining competent personnel across its business segments. The Company strives to maintain a safe, professional and conducive working environment and promotes teamwork, transparency, ethics and accountability. The Company's activities require an appropriate mix of managerial, technical, skilled and operational manpower. The Company's ability to attract and retain competent personnel, particularly technical and project execution personnel, will continue to be an important factor in achieving its business objectives.

7. CAPITAL EXPANSION AND CAPITAL EXPENDITURE:

Capital expenditure and expansion plans are evaluated based on business requirements, market opportunities, expected returns and availability of financial resources. The Company's future capital requirements may arise from expansion of its infrastructure and road-related activities, waste management operations, acquisition or deployment of equipment and other business requirements. The timing and scale of any capital expenditure will depend upon prevailing market conditions, availability of suitable opportunities, project requirements and the Company's financial position.

8. RELATIONSHIP WITH CLIENTS, BANKS, FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS AND OTHER STAKEHOLDERS :

The Company's business and revenue generation are dependent, inter alia, upon its ability to secure new orders, execute existing contracts efficiently and maintain long-term relationships with customers and business associates. The Company endeavors to maintain professional and transparent relationships with its customers, suppliers, banks, financial institutions and other stakeholders. The ability to secure repeat business and new opportunities, particularly in infrastructure, road-related and waste management activities, will remain an important factor in determining future growth.

9. KEY STRATEGIC HIGHLIGHTS :

The Company's key strategic focus areas include:

- Diversification across infrastructure, road construction, waste management, petroleum products and real estate-related activities;
- Expansion of opportunities in microsurfacing and road repair services;
- Development of the road construction materials and bitumen emulsion business;
- Strengthening the Company's presence in waste management activities;
- Identification of commercially viable infrastructure and real estate opportunities;
- Improvement in operational efficiency and cost management;
- Strengthening customer and business relationships;
- Adoption of appropriate technology and improved project execution practices; and
- Focus on sustainable and long-term business growth.

The Company remains focused on creating a balanced and diversified business portfolio and intends to pursue growth opportunities based on market conditions and commercial viability.

10. RISK AND CONCERNS :

12. OUTLOOK, OPPORTUNITIES AND THREATS :

The Company believes that its diversified business portfolio provides opportunities for growth across multiple sectors. The continued development and maintenance of road infrastructure presents opportunities in microsurfacing, road repair and allied services, as well as in the supply of bitumen emulsion and other road construction materials. OPINION

We have audited the accompanying Ind AS financial statements of **SANMIT INFRA LIMITED** ("hereinafter referred to as the Company") which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss (including the statement of Other Comprehensive Income), the Statement of Changes in Equity and the Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended on that date and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Further, there were no financial transactions in the said company during the year ended March 31, 2026. Accordingly, the said entity has not been considered for the purpose of preparation of the standalone financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026.

1. Basis of preparation and significant accounting policies:**1.1 Basis of preparation:**

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS), under the historical cost convention on the accrual basis except for certain financial instruments which are measured at fair values, the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') (to the extent notified) and guidelines issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI). The Ind AS are prescribed under Section 133 of the Act read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and the relevant amendment rules issued thereafter. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly-issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

1.2 Significant accounting, judgments, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires the Management to make estimates, judgments and assumptions. These estimates, judgments and assumptions affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Appropriate changes in estimates are made as the Management becomes aware of changes in circumstances surrounding the estimates. Changes in estimates are reflected in the financial statements in the period in which changes are made and, if material, their effects are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements

1.3 Summary of Significant accounting policies**a) Current versus non-current classification**

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/ non-current classification. An asset is treated as current when it is:

- Expected to be realized or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle held primarily for the purpose of trading
- Expected to be realized in normal operating cycle or within twelve months after the reporting period or
- Cash or cash equivalents unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle or due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents. The Company has identified period of twelve months as its operating cycle.

b) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognized upon transfer of control of promised goods to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration we expect to receive in exchange of product or services. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government.

Revenue is recognised only if following condition are satisfied:

- The performance obligations have been met;
- The Company retains neither continuing managerial involvement to the degree usually associated with ownership nor effective control over the goods sold;
- It is probable that the economic benefit associated with the transaction will flow to the Company; and
- it can be reliably measured and it is reasonable to expect ultimate collection.

c) Cash flow

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit / (loss) before extraordinary items and tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated based on the available information

d) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and impairment, if any. Cost directly attributable to acquisition are capitalised until the property, plant and equipment are ready for use, as intended by the management. Depreciation has been provided on written down value method in accordance with section 198 of the Companies Act, 2013 at the rates specified in schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013, on *pro-rata* basis with reference to the period of use of such assets.

Capital WIP

Cost of assets not ready for intended use, as on the balance sheet date, is shown as capital work in progress.

e) Amortisation of intangible assets

Intangible Assets as defined in Accounting Standard 26-“Intangible Assets” are valued at cost and amortised as per its useful life and value in use.

f) Finance cost

Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the cost of such assets. A qualifying asset is one that necessarily takes substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use. All other borrowing costs are charged to the statement of profit and loss in the period in which they are incurred

g) Inventories

Inventories of petroleum products and machinery are measured at lower of cost and net realizable value on FIFO basis after providing for obsolescence, if any. Cost of inventories comprises of cost of purchase and other cost incurred in bringing them to their respective present location and condition.

h) Lease

The Company assesses whether a contract is or contains a lease, at inception of a contract. The assessment involves the exercise of judgement about whether (i) the contract involves the use of an identified asset, (ii) the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from the use of the asset through the period of the lease, and (iii) the Company has the right to direct the use of the asset. The Company recognises a right-of-use asset (“ROU”) and a corresponding lease liability at the lease commencement date. The ROU asset is initially recognised at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred. They are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. The ROU asset is depreciated using the straightline method from the commencement date to the earlier of, the end of the useful life of the ROU asset or the end of the lease term. The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Company uses an incremental borrowing rate specific to the Company, term and currency of the contract. Generally, the Company uses its incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate.

The Company has elected not to recognize ROU assets and lease liabilities for short term leases as well as low value assets and recognizes the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

i) Income taxes

Income tax expense comprises of current and deferred tax.

Current income tax

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities in accordance with the Income-tax Act, 1961.

Current income tax relating to items recognized outside profit and loss is recognized outside profit and loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Current tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognized on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the Financial Statements and the corresponding tax bases, used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognized for all taxable temporary differences.

Deferred tax assets are generally recognized for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilized.

j) Provisions, Contingent liabilities, Contingent assets and Commitments

Provisions are recognized when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. The expense relating to a provision is presented in the statement of profit and loss. Provisions are not discounted to their present value and are determined based on the best estimate required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. These estimates are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

Disclosure of contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle or a reliable estimate of amount cannot be made.

A contingent asset is disclosed, where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

k) Financial instruments:

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

l) Foreign currency translation**Initial Recognition**

On initial recognition, transactions in foreign currencies entered into by the Company are recorded in the functional currency (i.e. Indian Rupees), by applying to the foreign currency amount, the spot exchange rate between the functional currency and the foreign currency at the date of the transaction. Exchange differences arising on foreign exchange transactions settled during the year are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Measurement of foreign currency items at reporting date

Foreign currency monetary items of the Company are translated at the closing exchange rates. Nonmonetary items that are measured at historical cost in a foreign currency, are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency, are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value is measured. Exchange differences arising out of these translations are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss

m) Financial assets**Initial recognition and measurement**

All financial assets are recognized initially at fair value plus, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit and loss, transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset.

Subsequent measurement

For purposes of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified in three broad categories:

Financial Assets measured at Amortised Cost (AC)

A Financial Asset is measured at Amortised Cost if it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold the asset in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the Financial Asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that represent solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding

Financial Assets measured at Fair Value Through Other Comprehensive Income (FVTOCI)

A Financial Asset is measured at FVTOCI if it is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling Financial Assets and the contractual terms of the Financial Asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that represents solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Financial Assets measured at fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL)

A Financial Asset which is not classified in any of the above categories are measured at FVTPL. Financial assets are reclassified subsequent to their recognition, if the Company changes its business model for managing those financial assets. Changes in business model are made and applied prospectively from the reclassification date which is the first day of immediately next reporting period following the changes in business model in accordance with principles laid down under Ind AS 109 – Financial Instruments.

Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind AS 109, the Company uses 'Expected Credit Loss' (ECL) model, for evaluating impairment of Financial Assets other than those measured at Fair Value Through Profit and Loss (FVTPL). Expected Credit Losses are measured through a loss allowance at an amount equal to:

- The 12-months expected credit losses (expected credit losses that result from those default events on the financial instrument that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date); or
- Full lifetime expected credit losses (expected credit losses that result from all possible default events over the life of the financial instrument).

ii. Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

All Financial Liabilities are recognised at fair value and in case of borrowings, net of directly attributable cost. Fees of recurring nature are directly recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss as finance cost

The Company's financial liabilities include trade payables.

Subsequent measurement

The measurement of financial liabilities depends on their classification, as described below:

Financial liabilities at amortized cost

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings and other payables are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the EIR method. Gains and losses are recognized in profit and loss when the liabilities are derecognized as well as through the EIR amortization process.

Amortized cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortization is included as finance costs in the statement of profit and loss.

For trade and other payables maturing within one year from the balance sheet date, the carrying amounts approximate fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognized in the statement of profit and loss.

iii. Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

n) Employee Benefits**Short term employee benefits**

All employee benefits payable wholly within twelve months of rendering the service are classified as short term employee benefits and they are recognized in the period in which the employee renders the related service. The Company recognizes the undiscounted amount of short term employee benefits expected to be paid in exchange for services rendered as a liability (accrued expense) after deducting any amount already paid.

Post Employment benefits**Defined Contribution Schemes**

All the employees of the Company are entitled to receive benefits under the provident Fund and employees State Insurance scheme, defined contribution plans in which both the employee and the Company contribute monthly at a stipulated rate. The Company has no liability for future benefits other than its annual contribution and recognises such contributions as an expense in the period in which employee renders the related service. If the contribution payable to the scheme for service received before the Balance Sheet date exceeds the contribution already paid, the deficit payable to the scheme is recognised as a liability after deducting the contribution already paid. If the contribution already paid exceeds the contribution due for services received before the Balance Sheet date, then excess is recognised as an asset to the extent that the pre-payment will lead to, for example, a reduction in future payment or a cash refund.

Defined Benefit Schemes

The Company provides for the gratuity, a defined benefit retirement plan covering all employees. The plan provides for lump sum payments to employees upon death while in employment or on separation from employment after serving for the stipulated years mentioned under 'The Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972'. The present value of the obligation under such defined benefit plan is determined based on actuarial valuation, carried out by an independent actuary at each Balance Sheet date, using the Projected Unit Credit Method.

The obligation is measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows. Remeasurement gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are recognized directly in the other comprehensive income in the period in which they occur. They are included in retained earnings in the statement of changes in equity and in the balance sheet. Remeasurements are not reclassified to the statement of profit and loss in the subsequent periods.

o) Segment reporting

In accordance with Ind AS 108 - Operating segments, segment information has been provided in the financial statements of the Company for the different identified segments.

p) Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share are calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period adjusted for bonus elements and share split in equity shares, if any, issued during the year.
